AUGUST PROGRAM

Come hear about Kentuckiana's newest park project (hint: it's on the Sunny Side). In 2017, the River Heritage Conservancy (RHC) began acquiring the land for the Origin Park project, a 400+-acre project along the Ohio River and Silver Creek in southern Indiana. To date, private donors have given more than \$6 million to acquire land for the park, and RHC is working with state and local governments to establish long-term leases on public land that is located within the park's future boundaries.

The land for the first phase of the park is already in hand, with some construction underway. The first 141 acres of the park are expected to be complete in 2026, and some areas will be opened to the public even sooner.

Our August speaker is the RHC's new executive director, Susan Rademacher. If that name seems familiar, it is because she spent 16 years (1991 to 2007) in Louisville as president of the Olmsted Parks Conservancy and assistant director of Louisville Metro Parks.

Come hear her discuss the vision for Origin Park, some of the natural and cultural resources (including birds, of course!) within the park footprint, and the challenges of bringing that vision to reality.

THE 2022-2023 FEDERAL MIGRATORY AND CONSERVATION STAMP

One of the easiest ways that anyone can support bird habitat conservation is by <u>buying</u> Federal Duck Stamps - among the most successful conservation tools ever created to protect habitat for birds and other wildlife.

Federal Duck Stamps are conservation revenue stamps; 98 percent of the purchase price goes directly to help <u>acquire and protect wetland habitat and purchase conservation easements</u> for the <u>National Wildlife Refuge System</u>. Wetlands acquired with Duck Stamp dollars help purify water, aid in flood control, reduce soil erosion and sedimentation, and enhance <u>outdoor recreation opportunities</u>.

As a birder one of the ways that your voice will be heard is to buy your stamp from the American Birding Association. You will also be showing your support for bird conservation in our national wildlife refuges. More information and how you can purchase your stamp can be found on the ABA website at aba.org. Special Invitation to Stand up for the Ohio River, Attend the Louisville Public Listening Session

Join us this summer in standing up for the Ohio River and our drinking water, public health, and quality of life. Please consider attending a listening session to help shape a regional plan to address water pollution issues and drinking water contamination in the 14-state Ohio River region.

The National Wildlife Federation, Ohio River Basin Alliance, and partners in the 14-state Ohio River region are hosting a series of public listening sessions this summer to get community input into a regional plan to restore and protect the Ohio River, its tributaries, and surrounding habitat for fish and wildlife – and for people – in Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Mississippi, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia.

JULY BIRDING

July was another hot month and birding started out slowly but as the month progressed you could see a change. More birds were active especially the new fledglings that were now out on their own. Birds were molting and getting their new feathers for the coming months or getting ready for their migration journey. You may have noticed more hummingbirds are showing up at your feeder. More reports were coming in for migrating shorebirds. Jefferson County had two Black-necked Stilts which was the third record for the county. Over one hundred species were reported for Jefferson alone. One of the great phenomena at this time

of year is the congregation of ten to twenty thousand Purple Martins on Rose Island Road in Prospect. It is a spectacular sight to see as the birds swirl about the area before they settle in for the night.

Next month, migration really begins to get in full swing as many neotropical birds start their long migration to Central and South America. This is a good time to study your field guides and be ready to bird with a friend or on one of the field trips.

Many of you may have the app Merlin but remember it is not 100% accurate. It does a great job but you should try to visually see the bird or verify it before adding it to your eBird list. Ask yourself is this bird in the right habitat or is it rare to Kentucky. As stated above this is a good time to get acquainted with the birds you will seeing during fall migration. As you may know eBird does not like you to add a bird to your list and state Merlin identified it.

Hope to see everyone out on the birding trail.
