Ecuador is a small nation with a lot of birds and an amazing diversity – 1,655 species, or 1,672 species per 100,000 square miles of land area. The United States, in contrast, has 1,175 species, or roughly 33 per 100,000 square miles. So a birding trip to Ecuador is bound to be exciting.

If you can't participate in the Louisville CBC, consider being a feeder watch counter. If you live in the count area all you need to do is count the birds that come to your feeder. There are protocols for counting the birds. Please let James Wheat know you will count the birds at your feeder and get the detail of how to participate.

PAST FIELD TRIPS

Trips to Pope Lick Park on October 30 and Hays Kennedy/Garvin Brown Preserve on November 7 were canceled.

Sauerheber Unit of Sloughs WMA, Henderson County, 23 October. — Twelve participants on a partly cloudy morning which turned all cloudy with rain showers that moved in about 2:00 pm took part in the field trip. Water had only recently begun to be pumped into the Shorebird Unit and into a couple of the Hardy Slough pools. Without some "old" water around, there weren't many marsh species. In fact, *one* Sora was the only rail we flushed. Pam Spaulding got photos and a couple of others got glimpses of the best bird of the trip, a Grasshopper Sparrow. We also all had great looks at both Sedge Wren and Marsh Wren. Three species of swallows were still around (Tree, Barn, Northern Rough-winged). There were a few species of waterfowl around highlighted by a couple of small groups of Greater White-fronted Geese. When the rain began, we tried a loop out towards Horseshoe Road but really saw nothing of interest.

Turkey Run Park – November 13 - Seven members turned out on a sunny but chilly morning to walk the Louisville Loop from the north entrance of Turkey Run Park up to the Sky Dome area, with a return via the Seaton Valley Trail. The grasslands along the Loop were loaded with sparrows (mostly Song) and American Goldfinches, with several overflights of blackbird flocks as well. A highlight was a flock of six Eastern Bluebirds, a happy sight after a largely bluebird-less summer. At the top of the hill the group found more sparrows and a laggard Orange-crowned Warbler which gave good looks to all. Alas, nobody had a camera. The Seaton Valley Trail was fairly quiet, but the raptors were up and soaring by late morning, so several species were added, bringing the trip total to 31 species, and one warbler that defied identification.

Popelick Park, November 13 Temps started in low 30s rising to low 40s. Skies started cloudy, then some sun and back to cloudy. Highlights included Purple Finches and Sharp-shinned Hawk.

Harrods Creek Park – November 20 Four intrepid birders braved the cold temperatures and rainy forecast. It began to drizzle at the end of the walk with a south wind at 11 mph. Birds were scarce with the approaching wintry mix but we had a good mix of the common winter birds. Both Kinglets, Song and White-throated Sparrows and several flocks of Robins and Blue Jays were seen by the group.



Muscatatuck NWR/Hardy Lake – November 26 On this beautiful but cold day three BBC members set out to see what birds they could find on the refuge and in the park. Waterfowl was hard to find at Muscatatuck, but Sandhill Cranes calling and flying overhead were a sight to behold. Common Loons were on Hardy Lake along with Bufflehead and Ruddy Ducks. Some other great finds were Bald Eagle, Red-breasted Nuthatches, Brown Creeper, Winter Wren, both Kinglets, Hermit Thrush,

and Tree, Fox and White-crowned Sparrows. Our grand total was 54 species for the two locations.

NOVEMBER BIRDING

What a great month for birds in our area -first record of an **Anna's Hummingbird** in Kentucky, seldom seen Black-legged Kittiwakes, Northern Shrike and Loggerhead Shrike showed up! A few warblers were present including Tennessee, Orange-crowned, Palm, Pine, Wilson's and Yellow-rumped. The Cox Park Merlin has returned. It has been seen at the park for the past several years. Sandhill Cranes have started their migration south. Have you heard them high overhead? Three species of gulls have been reported – Ring-billed, Herring, and Bonaparte. White Pelicans were seen on the



river. Waterfowl have been slow to return and only a few rafts have been seen on the river. Garvin Brown has both American Tree and Savannah Sparrows. There are a few Red-breasted Nuthatches around but nothing like last year. Several Saw-whet Owls were banded again this year. Hope you have been out birding and have seen some of the many special birds that are here. There have been over 120 birds reported in Jefferson County and the surrounding area this November. Join one of the field trips this coming month to get out and see the wonderful birds we have here in our area.
