

Birding Panama During Covid

PAST FIELD TRIPS

CREASY-MAHAN NATURE PRESERVE – JANUARY 15 - Six members came out under an overcast sky with temperatures just above freezing all morning. Had to work to find birds, especially in the wooded areas, but eventually tallied 31 species, with the last few at the feeders at the end of the walk. Finding a Winter Wren was surprisingly difficult given the number of brush piles on the property, but we finally got one. Didn't have so much as a hint of a Red-breasted Nuthatch, which are usually reliable here in winter. Best bird of the day was a Merlin, which flew over as we were birding the grasslands at the start of the walk. First eBird record at this location - another indicator that this species is becoming increasingly common in our area in winter.

POPE LICK PARK – JANUARY 23 -Ten brave members and guests met on a cold, cloudy and windy January day to see what birds we could find. Although the birding overall was quiet and slow, we found pockets of mixed flocks foraging along our walk making up for the slower sections. We managed to get 32 species in almost 3 hours. Highlights include getting 6 of the 7 possible woodpeckers (no red-headed), 7 species of sparrows (including Fox), and a very good look at a Barred Owl sitting on a tree stump close to the ground. All agreed it was a good birding day, especially for January!

MARCH DINNER MEETING

Owls are arguably the most widely recognized group of animals in the world. We recognize 268



species worldwide. They occur on all continents except Antarctica and have populated even the most remote islands, including Hawaii. Owl fossils date back to the Paleocene era and native cultures around the world are rich with stories and myths surrounding them. Yet, despite their worldwide distribution and cultural popularity, owls can be rather difficult to find—in fact most people will never see a wild owl in their lifetime. Why are they so hard to find? Adaptations. Owls have evolved many specialized traits and adaptations to help them survive.

Please join us for the March dinner meeting as world-renown owl expert Denver Holt uncovers and explains

these many adaptations. Mr. Holt is the founder and president of The Owl Research Institute based in Charlo, Montana. He has been studying owls and their ecology since 1978 and is one of the world's leading experts in the field. He has published over 100 research papers and has contributed to documentaries, books and magazines for *National Geographic*, BBC's *Planet Earth* series, *The New York Times, Smithsonian Magazine* and PBS. In 2018, he received the prestigious Chandler S. Robbins Award from the American Birding Association for his lifelong dedication to owl conservation, education, and research.

JANUARY BIRDING

The weather for January has been cold, windy and snowy. Waterfowl species pick up

maybe due to the weather with sightings of two nice species – Tundra Swans and Cackling Geese. Thanks to Jackie Elmore for his pictures of the swans and geese. Even though there has been an increase in the number of



species of waterfowl seen there has not been an increase in the overall number of birds on our lakes and river. Golden-eye, Bufflehead, Ruddy are being seen along with Greater and Lesser Scaup, Canvasback, Ring-necked, Black ducks and Green-winged Teal. The Anna's Hummingbird, Loggerhead Shrike and Short-eared Owls are still being



seen. The Merlin at Cox Park can be seen sitting on a snag of a tree next to the river. The Bald Eagles are still working on their nest at the Water Company ponds. A Gray Catbird was seen near the zoo. A Snowy Owl is being seen near Owensboro, KY. Next month look for Woodcocks displaying and Sandhill Cranes gathering near Cecilia, KY.
