PAST FIELD TRIPS

Creasey Mahan- April 27 Ten birders ventured out on a very windy, warm, and overcast day to find returning migrants. Not many warblers were seen, but 50 species were documented. Highlights included a Broad-wing hawk, Scarlet Tanager, multiple Baltimore Orioles, Black and White Warbler and Louisiana Waterthrush.



Bernheim Forest – May 10 Seven members and guests met on a cool May morning. We divided our trip into three parts: the area around the garden pavilion near Lake Nevin, the Guerilla Hollow area, and the area behind the Visitor's Center. Some of the highlights were good looks at a Kentucky Warbler and a couple of beautiful Summer Tanagers singing in the trees. A lovely day to be out in nature!



Caperton Swamp – May 16 Five members came out on a sunny morning with pleasant temperatures. Birding was slow with migrants not in evidence. Highlights of the trip were four baby Wood Ducks swimming around with no adult supervision, at least three adult Pileated Woodpeckers flying in and out of a large tree - some sort of domestic drama, perhaps, a

beautiful male Prothonotary Warbler singing at length in plain sight, and a flock of Cedar Waxwings gorging on mulberries.

Mammoth Cave National Park – May 19 Ten observers started the trip traveling along the splendid forest covered roads. Birds were rather hard to come by but we had great looks at many species. Elijah, a young birder from Washington county located a beautiful late Blackburnian Warbler. Due to a dead battery Elijah and his dad and brother were unable to finish the trip with us. The Green River Trail did not disappoint, despite there being millions (no make that billions) of green leaves on the trees and pollen so bad that several of us experienced coughing spasms. Warblers, flycatchers, vireos were quite vocal along with other species. When time came to go to Joppa Ridge our number had dwindled to just three. Highlights along the road included Hooded Warbler and a Barred Owl. Finishing the trip we traveled Flint Ridge Road. Here we would find grassland birds - Meadowlarks, Prairie Warblers, Kingbirds, Martins and Swallows. Our total for the day was 52 species. Not our best, but golly we gave it our best shot!

2024 Jefferson County Global Big Day Summary

Global Big Day was another great day for Jefferson County in our informal competition with Fayette County! Per eBird, we tallied 149 species on the day, and Fayette County tallied 144 species. Jefferson County was due for another win after losses in 2023 (Fayette - 157; Jefferson - 154) and 2022 (Fayette - 140; Jefferson - 129), and our local birders did not disappoint. They went out early and stayed out late searching. We had some nice rarities – Bell's Vireo, Red-breasted Merganser, and Painted Bunting (GBD first for Jefferson County!). However, we missed out on Great Horned Owl and Chuckwill's-widow, species usually counted on GBD.
